# MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

It is my pleasure to again write the annual message on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Bowen Island Public Library.

In January of 2012 the Board held a special strategic facility planning session that focused on the evolving role of the library, the changing demographics of the island and our future space needs. The Board was very pleased to welcome Mayor Adelaar and Councillor Duntz of the newly appointed municipal council to this planning session. It was agreed that the current library building is not large enough to support the changing role of the library and is at capacity now, and the Board voted to request that the library be included in the planning for the new community centre.

Based on that decision the Board contracted with Florrie Levine to conduct a space needs assessment to inform any planning for future space development. The findings of the assessment were presented to Council in May 2012 and the formal request made to be included in the planning for the community centre. The Chief Librarian was consequently appointed to the Bowen Community Centre Implementation Committee (BCCIC) on behalf of the Library. As of the end of Dec. 2012 the BCCIC was awaiting further direction from Council.

From May to July 2012 the Municipality conducted a "Householder Survey" intended to help inform the spending priorities of Council. The results were <u>published in September 2012</u>, with the library ranking highest in satisfaction among park, cultural and recreations services. After trails, the library was the service most highly utilized by Bowen residents and was rated fourth highest in importance, surpassed only by beaches, parks and trails.

The Board is currently in the fourth year of its 5-year strategic plan. Most of what we set out to do has been accomplished. In 2012 the Library Board continued to advocate for increased staffing, and a request for an increase of 0.5 FTE staff (18 hours per week) was approved for the 2013 budget year. Renovations and remodelling projects have improved the library interior, however, inadequate space continues as the outstanding issue. It has been recommended that the Board undertake a 3-year strategic planning session in the spring of 2013 and one of the tasks will be to review the space needs and the current realities.

Each year brings some new faces to the Board. Tim Rhodes was appointed as our municipal council representative and has been a strong advocate for the library. We were sorry to say goodbye to trustees Chris Pollard and Simon Parker, but were glad to welcome Melanie McLeod to the Board in 2012.

Patrons who visit the library may have noticed new tables, new shelving, newly painted walls and outdoor benches. Where do these improvements come from? They come from the Friends of the Library who raise funds through the mini bookstore in the library and the annual BookFest book sale. Thank you "Friends"!

The library is a warm and welcoming place because of its dedicated volunteers and amazing staff. Thank you to Susan Geist, Christine Miller, Sandy Mulholland and Janet Esseiva. And finally on behalf of the Board I would like to acknowledge and thank the Chief Librarian, Tina Nielsen who is the public face of the library in the community and the behind the scenes work horse. She is an inspiration to us all.

# MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF LIBRARIAN

I would like to begin by thanking our many volunteers whose generous donation of time and energy keeps the library deeply connected to the community; and to our wonderful staff, many thanks for your patience and unfailing commitment to excellent library service – even during these times of great change for libraries. I would also like to thank the library board members, who, as volunteers, give their time to set direction for the library and who support library staff in many ways beyond their statutory requirement. Thank you all.

Throughout 2012 the staff and volunteers of the Bowen Island Public Library have been implementing new programs and services that support our unique community needs and reflect the library's strategic plan. New public programs in 2012 included the opening of the Med Shed at the library (from its former place in a private home as the "Community Cupboard"); the lending of PowerCost Monitors provided by Bowen In Transition; 2 e-reader workshops presented by Chris Koth of North Van City Library; a 6 month Tech Tutor program offering free technology help and instruction; and the start of a partnership with the Arts Council offering literary events on Bowen. All of these new programs are funded through partnerships with other local organizations, grant funding or by our Friends of the Library.

The physical collections of the library have remained static in size for the past few years. Without additional space it is not possible for us to expand the size of our collections – except, of course, electronically. And thanks to collaborative purchasing across B.C. the Bowen Library has been able to expand our electronic collections by 31% in 2012, providing more than 81,000 electronic books, magazines and audiobooks to our patrons.

Our circulation of physical books and other items has been declining slightly for the past 3 years; however where we see growth is in the lending and using of electronic resources – ebooks, e-audiobooks, and e-magazines. Circulation of electronic collections has increased by more than 100% from 2011 to 2012. As with most libraries these days, we are carefully monitoring changes in the world of information and publishing, and are expanding the scope and definition of traditional library service, so that we can respond to the changing needs of our community. We see those changes in our own statistics. Bowen Library continues to grow - not in traditional book circulation, but in active registered patrons, programs, interlibrary loans, reference questions, and in both physical visits to the library and virtual visits to the library. Now more than ever, libraries are community hubs - conduits for information literacy, digital access and one of the few public spaces left that are free and open to all.

## THE MED SHED

In the spring of 2012 the island's "Community Lending Cupboard" was looking for a new home. This service, lending medical and mobility equipment, had

been operated in a private home for more than 20 years and was in danger of disappearing upon the sale of that home. After determining the space required, the library agreed to take on the service by housing the equipment in a shed behind the library. With the volunteer labour and discounted materials of local roofer Gary Charette, the shed was made leak-proof, while carpenter Ian

Thompson volunteered his time to close in the interior walls. The equipment was moved in July, and several more volunteers (staff member Sue Geist and local physiotherapist Sandy Logan) examined and checked all the equipment before

washing and sanitizing everything that was deemed lendable. By mid-August the Community Cupboard was reborn as the Med Shed and in its first 6 months has helped 28 people by lending more than 50 pieces of medical equipment. Library lending has always included a range of materials (books, DVDs, videos, kits, magazines, power cost monitors, e-readers), and the loan of medical equipment is just one more way of sharing community resources.

## SUMMER READING CLUB

It was "strange but true" that the library started this year's Summer Reading Club (SRC) with a special visit from Norden the Magician. SRC Coordinator Devon McLeod introduced Norden and the SRC 2012 theme of "Strange but True" to more than 150 students at Bowen Island Community School. Bowen Library has run an annual Summer Reading Club for 25 years with support from the Province of BC, the Government of Canada, the BC Library Association and the Royal Bank Financial Group. This year's SRC had 136 kids

of their annual plan. Funds from the Literacy Task Force were leveraged with a

donation of \$2500 from the Bowen Community Foundation (to purchase notebook computers), and participation in the Community Access Program Youth Initiative (CAPYI) that provided the wage for a tech tutor.

This popular program provided technology training and assistance to anyone in the community needing help with technology. James Barth was our

demeanour he served 110 community members with everything from learning to use a computer, to email set up, and cloud computing. This highly popular program ran for 5 months until funding ran out, and James moved on to a full time job. We plan to continue the program in 2013 once funding can be secured.
