A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR & LIBRARY DIRECTOR

Moving out of the COVID-19 lockdown was a relief for Bowen Library. The return to something close to "normal" was appreciated by staff and patrons alike, as we strove to welcome our community physically back into the library.

Not everyone felt comfortable venturing into public spaces, so Bowen Library planned for services and programs offered both in person and virtually. Tech Tutoring could fairly easily move to Zoom meetings, and we continued to offer programs online, streamed or recorded. Even board meetings became hybrid options allowing members and the public to attend online or in person.

Interim Library Director Jennifer Streckmann gracefully guided the library through most of 2022. She brought forward new programming initiatives, as well as supported staff to learn new skills for traditional library services and online opportunities.

To meet our strategic priority of social responsibility, the Library held a number of programs reflecting on Truth and Reconciliation. From Squamish traditional weaving to Indigenous storytelling and expanding our Indigenous collections, Bowen Library sought to celebrate Indigenous creators and advance the community's knowledge and understanding of the true history of Indigenous people on whose land we work and live.

Library visits and borrowing steadily increased in 2022 as people returned to the library to physically select and borrow materials. The largest increase was in the use of electronic materials.

The newly minted 2022-2024 Strategic Plan, informed our services and programs throughout 2022 and will continue to guide us over the coming years. We look forward to furthering the wishes of Bowen Islanders to create an inclusive, caring, and welcoming community.

2022 STRATEGIC HIGHLIGHTS

Our 2022-2024 Strategic Plan, is guiding the Library through 2022 and beyond, and is informed by the many things we learned from the pandemic, including the importance of being nimble and adapting to unanticipated changes. Social connection has always been part of public libraries mandates, but the pandemic made it even clearer how important everyday interactions between community members are to our well being.

Goal: Being Nimble, Staying current

Bowen Library followed a growing trend and removed overdue fines as of July 2022. This change reduces barriers to library use, particularly for those most vulnerable and marginalized in our community.

We undertook the start of a full policy review to ensure that our policies and procedures will help prepare us for unpredictable challenges.

Goal: Connecting with the Community

The library continued our sponsorship and support of the Write on Bowen festival, providing a venue for the festival in the Library Annex and outside on the newly landscaped grounds.

Community partnerships are important to the library and inform service decisions and support our own programs. In 2022 the Library continued to participate in the Bowen Literacy Task Group and was grateful for their funding to support Indigenous Storytime kits for community groups.

Goal: Discovery and Learning

Babytime came back as a pilot project in 2022 and was so well received that we aim to continue this important early literacy program in 2023.

National Indigenous Peoples Day was celebrated in the library with storytelling by Haida artist Kung Jaadee and a Squamish weaving lesson with Cheximiya.

Goal: Creating Welcoming Spaces

Construction began on the Snug Cove Cultural Corner Project in early 2022 and is expected to be complete by early 2023. The project will provide a stage-pavilion as well as increased outdoor seating and enhanced landscaping. Our enhanced exterior spaces will contribute vibrant, artistic outdoor community spaces where Bowen Islanders can gather and connect with each other and with culture.

Goal: Social Responsibility

Doing what we can to battle climate change, the library is proposing to use some of a provincial grant to retrofit the heritage library building with a heat pump, to reduce electricity costs and usage.

To improve accessibility for all, the Library installed automatic doors on two public washrooms and on all our entry doors into and within the library.

Sustainability, equity and furthering reconciliation under pin all of our strategic priorities.

Bowen Library continued to see Increases in circulation, visits to the library, new members and wifi connections. All signs of moving out of the pandemic and people feeling comfortable and able to return to the physical library.

During the pandemic lockdown and the closure of the physical library, many patrons began to explore e-books and e-audiobooks as an alternative means of finding books. Since learning how to find and use the library's electronic materials, people have continued using these resources and we are seeing circulation of electronic materials increase each year.

THE LIBRARY FOUNDATION

The Bowen Island Public Library Foundation, a recognized charitable organization, is dedicated to supporting the Bowen Library for one time special events, pilot projects, and extraordinary expenses during unforeseen circumstances. The Foundation accepts monetary contributions, bequests, endowments and trusts to enhance the resources of the Bowen Island Public Library, providing tax receipts for donations. Its operations are overseen by a Board of Directors and a Senior Manager.

In 2022 the Foundation, in partnership with the Hearth Gallery, spearheaded the creation and construction of the Snug Cove Cultural Corner. The project provides improved landscaping, walkways, lighting and a new community gathering space called the stage pavilion outside the Library and Hearth. The Foundation received a \$398,000 Provincial CERIP grant in 2021 and oversaw the expenditure of that grant and the completion of the project in 2022.

Along with the CERIP grant, during 2022 the Foundation raised an additional \$10,112 in direct donations and other grants.
